## Meet Winnie, Sophie, Mungu, & Tina!



In our last newsletter, I talked about the overwhelming need that we see in Uganda. This season has been one of abandonment. We receive 3 to 4 calls a day from the police and our social welfare officer asking us to take in children. Recently, the Ugandan government passed new laws in regards to child protection and the running of orphanages. This has been good as there are many orphanages (over 500) in Uganda that are operating illegally and with the sole purpose of exploiting children. The new laws are implementing stricter regulations and many of these illegal orphanages are being closed. This has helped to protect many children's lives but also means that good homes are being inundated with children because of the shortage of government approved children's homes.

On June 23rd, Joseph received a call from the police station. At the police station we met Winnie (7), Sophie (6), Mungu (3), and Tina (1). They had been living with their father



because their mother had left their father for another man. The father and an older brother abandoned the children. Winnie, the oldest child, left her other siblings where they were living and went to find someone to help. She made it to the police station where she told the Child Family Protection Unit (CFPU) about her other siblings and that they had been abandoned. The CFPU quickly took Winnie to find the other siblings and was able to find a pastor friend to take them for a few days while she looked for their parents. After a few days, Rafiki was called to take in the siblings since it was taking a while to trace their parents. The Rafiki Team was able to go see where the siblings had been staying and talk to a neighbor who said their mother left four months ago leaving them alone with their father in the unfinished house. Winnie was able to tell Auntie Doreen, one of our childcare workers, about some family members she knew about. Winnie is a very bright child and could remember where her father and older brother work and where her grandparents live. Auntie Florence, our social worker, has begun to follow up with the neighbors and police to trace family members.

Please pray for these children as they adjust to being at the Children's Home. Please pray that family members can be traced and that they can be reunited with extended family.

Rafiki staff are removing jiggers from the children's feet. Jiggers (NOT CHIGGERS) are parasitic burrowers. They are small chigoe fleas that live in the dust and are found on the dirt floors in many schools and homes in Uganda. The female jiggers burrow into the surface of skin that has been exposed to the flea. Once embedded, the jigger lays eggs and creates up to pea-size egg sacks and continues to multiply by laying more eggs. Infections from jiggers can be quite serious and can even lead to death.

## Thank you to Fathers!

Last month we celebrated Father's Day. We honored our fathers and celebrated fatherhood, paternal bonds, and the influence of fathers in society. The role of a father is very important in a child's life. In Scripture, there are many different names used to describe God. The name "Abba Father" is one of the most significant names of God in understanding how He relates to people. The word *Abba* is an Aramaic word that would

most closely be translated as "Daddy." It was a common term that young children would use to address their fathers. It signifies the close, intimate relationship of a father to his child, as well as the childlike trust that a young child puts in his "daddy". Our earthly fathers should be a picture of the love our Heavenly Father never stops pouring out on us.

One of our male staff, Uncle Godfrey, is a great example of what a father should be. He is not married and has no biological children of his own, but he serves as a father everyday at the Children's Home. The other day I watched Joel and Jerom tie their shoes and I asked, "How did you learn that?" I had not taught them. They told me, "Uncle Godfrey taught us." Their biological father should have been the one to teach them, but instead he abandoned them. Uncle Godfrey impacts the children's lives everyday as a father figure...in small ways like learning to tie their shoelaces and in big ways like learning how God loves them.
