

Meet Baby Florence and Max! Be A Part of Their Story!

The first month of a child’s life – the newborn period – carries the highest risk of death. More than 90 percent of newborn deaths occur in sub-Saharan Africa. 90% - that’s huge!!! “More than 1 million newborns die on the first day of life, making the birth day the most dangerous day for babies in nearly every country” (statistics from Save the Children).




Joseph and I (Sara) were talking to someone the other day about the process of how we get children into the home. The process begins with the police notifying us about an abandoned child. We have built relationships with over 15 police stations in and around Kampala. Many women in Uganda decide to abandon their newborn babies at hospitals, discard them on the streets or in pit-toilets, leaving them to die.

Most of these infants die and a few who are found in time are taken to the police. If the child survives the first few days it is considered a miracle. We believe this miracle is from God! We do not pretend to understand why some babies live and others do not. We have lost two babies in the past. Both of these babies died within the first couple of days after receiving the child from the police. It is heartbreaking.

We rejoice when we are able to save a child. Baby Florence and Max were received into the home recently. Baby Florence was only 2 days old. She was abandoned in a bush on the side of the road. Thankfully, someone found her and took her to the police who then called us for emergency care. Max was abandoned a couple of days before Florence. He was found alone, wandering the streets.

The number of abandonment cases in the past years has rapidly increased. One of the problems we face as a ministry is that the need is higher than we can handle. Every day we have to deal with life and death situations, when the police contact us, sometimes in the middle of the night, and ask us to come and collect another tiny one, who has been abandoned, but who is miraculously still alive. If we were to accept every child that we receive a call about, then



we would quickly have over 1,000 children in our care. We are over stretched by the high number of abandoned children, lack of space to take in more children, and lack of financial resources.

I have been especially touched by Mama Monica. They say she speaks the least amount of English, but I still find our communication to be quite effective. She has such a servant's heart, and is so good with the little ones. I love watching how gentle and kind she is to each and every kid. She is always working in the kitchen, or helping with baby Florence. Her heart and love for every person in this ministry has truly inspired me.

I have gotten the opportunity to meet kids that have previously lived at Rafiki, but now have been resettled in their homes. I loved visiting Emma (Emmanuel) whose family lives in a village and has a little farm with chickens, pigs, and sheep. Rafiki helped the family start this farm, so they could help provide financially. It was really neat to see the happy reunited family, and to see how greatly this ministry had impacted their life.”

The kids here are so sweet, and well behaved. It's been amazing to see growth in the kiddos in such a short time span. One of the younger boys, James, has grown from the baby room to the big boy room, and has really played the part. It's really neat to see how he has matured, and now helps with other little ones. I have been touched by each of the kids in different ways. Just to name a few, Hannah has really improved her listening skills, as well as Ruth. The older kids are very well behaved, and are always willing to help with the little ones or lend a helping hand in the kitchen or in washing their laundry.



Since I have been here we have gotten the addition of two children, baby Florence and Max. What a blessing each child has been to me, and to each other. Max is now fully immersed in this life, and used to the routine. At first we thought he was a baby, so it is incredible to see how much he has grown physically and just in helping take care of himself. ally and just in helping take care of himself.

Mama Sara and Uncle Joseph have been incredibly welcoming to me, and have invited me into their home on multiple occasions. I have loved getting to play a small part in this ministry, and just see how God weaves everything together here at the orphanage. The African lifestyle is one to be admired. I have learned to bathe kids in minimal time using minimal cold water. I have learned to not be phased by finding ants, bugs, or baby spiders in food we're preparing. I have learned to cut



onions without crying. I have learned to prepare the breakfast of buttered bread sandwiches for every kid in a speedy amount of time. I have learned a few Luganda key phrases I will use every once in a while. I have learned to perfect the African fried omelet. Throughout my time here, I have learned quite a few things, but most of all I have learned to not only embrace, but love the African lifestyle.

God is doing amazing things in this country. In church last week, they showed how much the community has grown physically in 30 years, and how you could not find a café 30 years ago. I love seeing people so passionate about advocating for Uganda. Uganda is a stunningly humid and green country, which I have fallen in love with. God is doing incredible things in this and through this organization and I'm so grateful to be part of it if only for a short time."

This camera will be used by our social worker and staff for documentation. This camera will also help us to make sure that supporters are kept up-to-date with everything that is going on with the ministry.
