Meet Hannah



We welcomed Hannah into the Children's Home on Friday, June 27th. The police contacted Joseph about a little girl that was not being cared for properly. Her mother had died shortly after she was born and her father, a day laborer on local farms. was not able to care for her. He would go out

each day to find work and leave Hannah alone without supervision all day. Can you imagine? Hannah is only 1½

years old. This is just another example of how God can turn a desperate situation into good. Hannah's father, a former Muslim, became a Christian about 2 months ago. He prayed for a way to care for his daughter. She came to us with a Muslim name, but he asked that she be given a Christian name. After meeting her, we chose the name Hannah. We are praying that, like Hannah in the Bible, she will become a strong woman of faith.

Hannah came to us with an extended belly and malnourished. She has only been with a few days but is already thriving in our care. It seems like she has been here forever because she fit right in to the Rafiki family. Hannah is very spunky and immediately started playing and laughing with the other children. We have taken her for a medical check-up and everything is fine except for malnourishment. She becomes very vocal when she sees food. She loves to eat! On the way to the clinic we gave her some bread and she became very tearful when we arrived and thought her bread was being taken away. We are working with her to lessen her fear of not getting to eat.

Pray for Hannah as she continues to adjust to being in the Children's Home. Pray for us to be able to work with her father. Pray that her father will continue in his growth as a follower of Christ.

Oli Otya (How are you?). We have been here in Uganda for over a week now and so many exciting things have taken place. This past week we have visited some baby homes and volunteered our time there by feeding, washing, cleaning, as well as enjoying loving on some cute kids. A good part of our stay here in Uganda we will be doing outreach at several different baby homes. It is always interesting to compare how things are structured at each place. Some are family styled homes while others are institutionalized. I have been encouraged this past week by the different places we visited, for the main goal of each place was to love and provide permanent homes, whether through resettlement, foster care, or adoption.

What I love about Rafiki is that these kids are each other's family. They will grow up with one another and will never be forced

to leave the home because of age. When a new child comes they are instantly welcomed into the family. Well, leave it to one of the newest and youngest members to teach me a big lesson.

Janat is a young two year old who is cute as a button but as feisty as an African lion. Unfortunately my husband, Philip, and I's instant adoration for her was not easily returned. We are some of the first Aunties and Uncles that Janat has encountered, and in Philip's case, he had three strikes going against him. He was mzungu (light skinned), a male, and had the most terrifying beard on his face. Earlier this week we were all coloring at the table and Philip

simply sat next to Janat and her cry quickly let the whole neighborhood know she did not approve of his choice of seat. I, however, took the more knowledgeable approach with Janat. I let her take her time and come to me. When she was in need of a toy, I gave her the one she wanted. When she wanted a bottle, I instantly arose to fetch it. I basically beckoned to whatever her little heart desired. Nonetheless, Janat now lets me hold, clothe, change, bathe, play and offer comfort by her choice. While she does still demand a task from me every now and then, at least she does so with a smile.

Now I'm sure there are many lessons that can be learned from this story, but allow me to share with you what I took from it: unconditional vs. conditional love. How many times have I thrown fits to God or demanded He perform certain tasks to cater to my "needs"? Why do I sometimes only go to God when I am in want of something and only return gratitude of thanks after

the deed has been performed? I am extremely grateful that we serve a God whose love for us is unconditional. His love is constant, regardless of my selfish nature. My prayer for this week at Rafiki is that I want my love to be unconditional for each child here, despite my lack of sleep or patience when they disobey. I want to extend a love here to the children in Uganda that lets them know that unconditional love can exist with no strings attached.

We quickly packed a few clothes and formula and went to the police. Baby Junior's story is heartbreaking and we will include it in the next month's newsletter. Please keep him in your prayers as he needs to gain weight quickly, otherwise he is surprisingly healthy. We are feeding him every 2 hours (even at night) and he receives IV antibiotics twice a day. It is much like caring for a newborn.

- Pray for the children and staff as we strive to be more like Jesus everyday. Pray for the children as they learn more about the Lord daily and grow in their walk. Pray they will accept Him as their personal Savior.
